- 2. Give a plausible counterexample to the conditional.

3. Give a plausible counterexample to the following conditional:

If x improves A's well-being, and does not reduce anyone else's well-being, then it is morally permissible to do x to A.

4. Give a plausible counterexample to the following conditional:

If A says "yes" to x, then it is morally permissible to do x to A.

5. Give a plausible counterexample to the following conditionals; you can use the same example if you want:
If A would have said "yes" to x were A rational, then it is morally permissible to do x to A.
If A has previously given morally relevant consent to $x$ , then it is morally permissible to do $x$ to $A$ .
