Differences between humans and non-human animals

Each of the following is an alleged difference between humans and animals, which is supposed to be relevant to 1 and 2 in Singer's argument (see other handout).

	 Eliminate any that are not relevant to Singer's claim. Of those which remain, turn each into a conditional: "If being A and B are different in the following way, then a certain amount of pain for A is less intrinsically bad than that same amount of pain for B." For each conditional, are there counterexamples?
a.	Humans and animals experience the same event differently (e.g. slapping baby vs. slapping horse).
b.	Animals can't contemplate the future; humans can.
с.	Humans can understand the context of an experience, but animals cannot.
d.	Animals are less intelligent than humans.
e.	Animals have less memory capacity than humans.
f.	Animals are not innovative; humans are.
g.	Animals are more habit-governed than humans.
h.	Animals bond faster than humans.
i.	Animals don't build societies; humans do.
j.	Animals hurt other beings for self-interested reasons; humans do not.
